EYE DROPS & SEXUAL ASSAULTS

Report from a drug counselor in Rochester, NY. Eye drops are apparently being used to incapacitate women as a mechanism for sexual assault. The products, Visine, Murine, etc are added to a drink. Although, I first assumed that LSD or GHB must also be involved, this is not the case. Eye drops contain one of three drugs called Imidazoline decongestants. Tetrahydrozoline, Naphazoline and Oxymetazoline are in high enough concentration in the 1/2 oz bottle that a few squirts causes abrupt loss of consciousness.
